The study of English Literature and Creative Writing together offers the opportunity to practise across a wide variety of texts, from poetry and drama to fiction and creative non-fiction. Students will understand the development of 'English' literature as diverse and multicultural, and learn about key theories that explore the impact of race, gender, class, national identity and ethnicity on literary texts.

An important part of the programme is the enhancement of an individual student's own creative practice through workshops, as well as with support from tutors and through our Live Projects modules, which gives them the chance to work with an external partner on an element of creative writing. Our students have run creative writing competitions, with schools as well as in the business world, organised a major comic event in Preston and produced short story anthologies of publishable standard. The teaching team consists of award winning writers who have experience of the publishing world as well as of creative practice and are in an ideal position to help to get our students started as practitioners.
